Centennial Weekend Wrap-up

We did it. After countless phone calls, thousands of miles of travel, and many hours of planning, the Cornell Chapter of Acacia Fraternity successfully completed the most exciting event in our history. More than 120 alumni returned to campus to celebrate our first hundred years. Bill Cammuso '92 enjoyed "reuniting with so many alumni" and observed, "the turnout was spectacular." We had a reunion that was worthy of our chapter's proud history, and learned lessons that can be used by the planners of the next reunion.

We began our event on Friday, August 24 with a commemoration of the chapter's history. Ithaca's Taste of Thai catered an event in Duffield Hall that allowed brothers from different eras to meet and exchange stories. After dinner, Thomas Balcerski '05 delivered a presentation on his research for *Acacia Fraternity at Cornell: The First Century*. The question and answer session after the lecture generated plenty of memories, including stories about the chapter's cooks, social events and alcohol policy. When asked for his favorite part of the weekend, David Pattison '83 echoed the feelings of many brothers in replying, "the book and the history presentation." Robert Baker '53 commented, "Tom did an outstanding job on the book and his presentation." We concluded the evening in the Regent Lounge at the Statler Hotel, where the dedication of the brothers really hit home for me. For example, I learned that Bill Feth '99 took five airline flights that day so he could be there.

The next day, the alumni went on a house tour and saw all of the recent improvements. Thanks to the leadership of Venerable Dean Kyle Small-Davis '09 and Senior Steward John Ryan '09, the house was as inviting as it has ever been. Jim Symons '54 commented that the "visit to the house" was the highlight of the weekend. We rented two buses to take interested attendees on a campus tour, which visited the athletic facilities, including the men's hockey team locker room at Lynah Rink. We even got to hear from two hockey players who were training that day. Eric Fish '08 and Elie Bilmes '10 did an excellent job in acting as tour guides. We then had lunch at the Big Red Barn.

On Saturday evening, we gathered in the atrium of Statler Hall for a reception and enjoyed music from the a capella group the Touchtones, who sang four songs, including the alma mater. Cornell University President David Skorton also attended the reception. We spent an hour in a brothers-only meeting discussing the capi-

tal campaign and plans for the future. Preston Shimer '61 enjoyed the "brothers meeting because of the spirit and energy that developed in the room." We took a group picture, which presented a bit of challenge because of the size of the group, but the picture came out well and will soon be mailed to all attendees.

Over 250 people attended the banquet dinner that night, making it the largest formal event in our chapter's history. We heard from a number of speakers, including Cornell University Vice President Susan Murphy, Acacia Executive Director Darold Larson, and Acacia International President David Allen. Other attendees included Acacia Treasurer Rob Roberson, International Counselor Greg Owen, Assistant Executive Director Keith Bushey, and Kara Miller and Travis Apgar from Cornell's Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs. Several brothers offered toasts, including Ivan Szanto grad, who explained how Acacia brothers took in several immigrant students from Hungary in the mid 1950s. The speakers all did a great job in discussing of our fraternity. Future event planners will certainly consider keeping the program shorter. We then enjoyed Paul Molnar '98's documentary on Acacia history, and danced to the music of Tom Knight and the Blue Moon. Seven brothers received the Order of Pythagoras recognizing contributions to the fraternity "beyond the call of duty" that evening, including Hollister Moore '68, David Fischell '75, David Klesh '02, Michael Nasatka '04, Thomas Balcerski '05, Bradley Ayres '06 and Andrew Cox '07.

Everyone said goodbye at brunch at the house on Sunday, but no one will forget the good time we all had. We have commemorative items, including personalized mugs, t-shirts and polo shirts, thanks to Tom Balcerski. There are so many ways to continue to give back, and none of them are too difficult. The capital campaign needs generous donations to ensure that our house will continue to be one of the most impressive on campus. We need more participation on the corporation board and with alumni advisory efforts. Many people thanked the event organizers. The best way to thank them is to get involved. There was a front page article about the weekend in the *Cornell Daily Sun* on Monday, August 27. Senior Dean Eric Fish '08 was quoted as "saying that he was lucky to 'meet the people who built this house.'" Let's see more involvement and continue building our fraternity.

CENTENNIAL CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

CELEBRATING OUR PAST—ENSURING OUR FUTURE

Our recent Centennial celebration was a remarkable occasion. Cornell Acacians spanning multiple generations returned to Ithaca to rekindle bonds with their former classmates, reminisce about their time at the chapter house, and meet members from different eras. Looking ahead, we must ensure that the chapter remains successful so that Cornellians can continue to be a part of our fraternity.

At the celebration, we formally launched our Centennial Capital Campaign, which will span the next five years. Our total fundraising goal is \$345,000, which would cover several important projects. In brief, we plan to install a sprinkler system, complete house maintenance that has gone unfunded for decades, and refurbish the library room. We also plan to grow our Acacia Fraternity Foundation chapter account to finance scholarships, leadership training programs, and other educational activities.

Since the Centennial, we have received a number of donations, noted on the last page of this newsletter. The response has been promising, but all of our alumni must participate if we are to achieve our ambitious goal. With your support of this special fundraising effort, we can make the chapter more attractive to potential new members and keep the facility in good condition for years to come.

I. Our Goals

While there are many projects we would like to undertake, the following list represents what we would like to accomplish during the course of the campaign. To accomplish our many worthwhile projects, we have established a 70-30 split between donations to the corporation and the Acacia Fraternity. Regardless of their destination, all funds raised through the Centennial Capital Campaign will go towards projects essential to safeguarding the chapter's future.

Fire-Suppressant Sprinkler System: \$125,000

Despite the significant cost, the sprinkler system is a necessity. Cayuga Heights has recommended for several years that high occupancy homes install sprinkler systems. We anticipate this recommendation will become a requirement within the next few years. The safety of the active brothers justifies paying the high cost—we do not want the chapter to

experience a tragedy that could have been prevented. Additionally, our relevant insurance premia will decline after we install the sprinklers.

Complete Planned House Improvements: \$120,000

Several planned maintenance projects have been neglected over the years due to a lack of funding. These projects cover several areas from common room refurbishment to exterior improvements. Below are examples of the projects we now intend to complete:

- Replace Commons Carpet, Curtains, & Furniture – new in 1955
- Replace Kitchen Cabinets – new in 1962
- Repair Stucco and Re-paint Exterior
- Pave, Enlarge, and Overhaul Parking Lot
- Add a Patio outside of Dining Room
- Insulate, Carpet, and Heat Third Floor Dormitory – never has had heat!
- Replace Steam Furnace – dates from the 1970s
- Build Safety Fence for Service Entrance Ledge
- Brick Front Walkway
- Save for Upcoming Roof Replacement – last replaced in 1991

Refurbish Chapter Library & Dedicated Study Areas: \$40,000

The Chapter Library has had the same furniture since 1947. It is clearly time for an upgrade, and we hope to restore the room into a refined, traditional environment conducive to study. We plan to replace the current furniture with high quality wooden tables and chairs, refinish the room's wooden shelves and doors, replace the carpeting and curtains, touch up the walls and ceiling, install a glass-enclosed trophy case, and re-frame the historically

significant pictures and documents hanging on the walls. We also plan to install a stained-glass window or ornate wood carving in the door from the Commons to the Chapter Room. We hope that the revitalized Chapter Library will serve as an alumni gift commemorating the Centennial. We also intend to replace some of the furniture currently in the second and third floor study rooms and complete other modest enhancements.

Increase Acacia Fraternity Foundation Chapter Account: \$60,000 and up

Each Acacia Fraternity chapter has an account with the Acacia Fraternity Foundation (AFF). Funds from individual chapter accounts may be used towards educational expenses, leadership development programs, scholarships and other related activities. We hope to grow our account balance so that we may earn more through the associated investment returns, and thereby spend more on qualifying items.


Your Gift Will Help with Recruitment
