A Message from our Corporation Board President

Brethren,

As reported in the Spring '01 Traveler, the complete rewiring of the electrical circuits in the old part of Acacia was started, and, except for one circuit, is complete. There are still some receptacles to be replaced, and a couple of new lights to be installed. All remaining electrical work will be taken care of in early November. A ceiling fan/light was just installed (by yours truly) in the Center Room (where no ceiling fixture ever existed), and another was installed in one of the wing rooms. A couple of big trees had to be removed (requiring a tree surgeon) over the summer, and the steam boiler was just repaired. The list of maintenance needs seems to get longer with every tick of the clock.

The fund raising effort for the Pearl Murray Memorial Dining Room has seen a few Brothers making extremely generous contributions. In 2000-2001, contributions totaled \$1,425 from only 7 Brothers. But, our anticipated expenses are almost \$11,000! Please, we need your help NOW. The new dining room doors will be installed before Thanksgiving. The interior walls and ceiling need some repair and a fresh coat of paint. New drapes for the windows are long overdue. The framed portrait of Pearl, which will hang prominently in the dining room to be dedicated in her memory, has yet to be ordered. A dedication ceremony will hopefully be scheduled in the spring, provided that we can complete the necessary maintenance and improvements.

For those who haven't been back in a while, Acacia Fraternity is looking GREAT! The Corporation is continuing its never-ending challenge of improvements and necessary maintenance on a limited budget. Other anticipated expenses for 2001-2002 include replacing the windows in the End Room and Center Room with energy efficient replacements, like those installed last year in the Wing and 3rd Floor. Also, we want to replace the 30-year old mattresses and box springs in the dorm. Of course, these all cost money that the Corporation does *not* have.

To all the Cornell Acacians (only 80) who provided financial support during the current and previous academic year, THANK YOU! We hope even more of you will find a way to assist in keeping our great Fraternity financially solvent during this academic year. Please return the enclosed Dues form at your earliest convenience. Acacia *desperately* needs your financial support! Note that, starting this fall, Cornell Acacia will begin accepting donations on-line via PayPal. Path of Pythagoras Freshmen Scholarship Recruitment 2001

In an effort to get our name out to more Freshmen on campus, this year we sent our annual Path of Pythagoras Scholarship letter and application to ALL incoming Cornell males. The Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs approved the mailing, and worked with the Registrar and Campus Mailing Services to get it delivered to the Freshmen on time. By sending the application to ~1600 students, we received 40 applications (mostly through our webform, which forced them to browse our website). This is twice the amount received over last year when we handed the applications out on North Campus. From October 23rd-25th, the brothers held interviews for 3 hours per night, getting to know 40 top notch Freshmen in the process. The recipient selection process was quite difficult, but we have managed to pick our 1 \$1000, 2 \$500, and 5 \$100 winners, who will all be notified November 1st. We plan on keeping in touch with and having events for most of the scholarship applicants. Many have shown interest in the fraternity, and if we follow through on them, a very successful Spring recruitment period is inevitable!

Acacia Fraternity Foundation

For the last several years I've served as president of the Acacia Fraternity Foundation. The Foundation provides over \$170,000 to Acacia and its chapters each year. Many of you may not know that the Foundation also provides alumni, parents and friends of Cornell Acacia a way to make tax-exempt contributions to the chapter.

Since 1990 the Foundation's Cornell chapter account has provided annual \$1,000 Fraternityship awards named in honor of Wayne Kuhn '26 and numerous additional chapter scholarships. Over the years, the chapter has also used its Foundation account to fund a graduate resident advisor to help with rush and officer training, and to pay for chapter attendance at Acacia's annual Leadership Schools and Conclaves, installation of a computer network and server in the chapter house, monthly Internet access charges and faculty dinners at Northcote.

Although use of the chapter's Foundation account is limited by IRS regulations to scholarships and qualified educational expenses, the Foundation strives to be flexible and the possibilities are limited only by the amount of funds raised by the chapter for its Foundation account. All contributions to the chapter's Foundation account are tax deductible for the donor.

However, contributing to the chapter's Foundation account should not be a substitute for ongoing support of the chapter's annual alumni dues program. Steve Stein, Jim Showacre and the other dedicated members of the house corporation depend upon our annual alumni dues to fund necessary repairs and improvements to the chapter house. Our continued support of their work through the chapter's alumni dues program is essential.

For the same reason, your continued support of the International Fraternity through the Foundation's Annual Fund is vital. The Annual Fund provides over one-third of Acacia's budget, reducing the need to increase chapter dues and funding Acacia's leadership training programs, including Leadership Consultant visits to Cornell and other chapters every year. The chapter's Foundation account provides a means for alumni to

provide additional support to Acacia and the Cornell chapter while also receiving a valuable tax deduction. As you consider your annual charitable giving priorities, I encourage you to include

Giving to the Foundation's Cornell chapter account is easy. Just indicate on your Annual Fund reply form or on your check the amount of your contribution that you want to direct to the Cornell Chapter account. Contributions can be made at any time and should be mailed to the Acacia Fraternity Foundation at 8777 Purdue Road, Suite 130, Indianapolis, IN 46268. Checks should be made payable to "Acacia Fraternity Foundation."

Donations to the chapter's Foundation account can also be made by stock transfer. Additional methods include making the Foundation a beneficiary of life insurance policies, annuities or charitable remainder trusts. Gifts of appreciated stocks, life insurance policies or other investments allow the donor to deduct the full market value of the donation while avoiding capital gains taxes. Finally, including the Foundation in your estate planning can eliminate or significantly reduce estate and gift taxes and benefit Acacia.

My big brother, Dave Klesh, and myself made our way to the Indiana Chapter of Acacia for the 5 day ALA to learn how to become better leaders for the Cornell Chapter. As Venerable Dean and Senior Dean, we are the ones who will lead the fraternity in the coming year and we therefore thought this experience would be invaluable. Dave and I both registered for the academy and flew into Indianapolis using the Cornell portion of the Acacia Fraternity Foundation money that has been donated over the years by our generous alumni. We encourage alumni to consider donating to this tax-deductible fund so that the future of the chapter will be able to learn to become better leaders as have we.

The experience began when International Headquarters leadership consultant, 'Canacian' (Canadian Acacian) Phil picked us up from the airport and drove us to the IU Chapter House. And perhaps the most amazing part of the entire trip was just getting to see the house. It was easily the nicest and largest fraternity house on campus, and it had 80 brothers living in (in a dormer of course). Another fine aspect was having those tall Indiana blondes hootin' and hollerin' as they drove by the mansion. I don't know about you, but I've yet to hear any of this as Cornell girls drive past 318 Highland. Well, entering the fraternity house was another jaw-dropping experience. High Tech and History

In the past couple issues of the Traveler there were mentions of plans to get a new wireless network running in the chapter house. Always on the cutting edge, Acacia was one of the first fraternities to have a shared house network and connection to the internet, but it consisted mostly of old phone cable that was spliced every 25 feet with electrical tape and stapled to the walls and ceiling. With money from our chapter's Acacia Fraternity Foundation fund, we purchased our first trial wireless hub back in January. This summer we finished the job, purchasing a second hub. Now every brother except for a couple seniors (who will take their wires with them when they leave) is connecting to the internet using wireless cards inside their personal desktop or laptop computers. The wires have been removed, and the mess is gone.

As part of the wireless project, we needed to consolidate our internet hubs, router, and cable modem into one place. we decided to use the smallest room on the second floor, returning it to a common office space that now holds all our shared high tech equipment. In the same move the actives cleared out the room and moved in new filing cabinets with our old files. It's amazing what we found in those files. We have old test files going back through the years to the seventies, so if you graduated in the past thirty years we probably have some of your old exams in there. We also came across old officer folders from the same period. We knew they were there, but they were not accesible in their old storage spot. They're in a much better place now, and while some of it needs

updating, most of it is still applicable today. We would like to thank the alumni who were officers and took the time to file things away; it is appreciated for both its continued usefulness and historical value.

Finally, we have better organized the oldest files, including old correspondences with alumni, membership records (inclusive from intiate 001 to our current 1057), and correspondences with the oldest chapters of Acacia from our chapter's founding until the mid-thirties. We even found noteworthy correspondence from President Taft of the Yale Chapter. The letters are now framed and proudly displayed in our Chapter Room.
