Message from Our Corporation Board President

The 2018-2019 Fiscal Academic Year has flown by. The Corporation Board focused on a couple of strategic maintenance projects that should provide a more inviting and attractive facility. Our focus was on what we originally classified as a "mini-renovation" of the Wing Bathroom, concentrating on the front (non-shower) area where the vanity, toilets, and urinal are located. The renovation started just before Christmas and was about 90% completed when Rush began the third week of January. The shower area was renovated back in the summer of 2012 and is in excellent condition. The mini-renovation plan involved replacing the original, 3-sink vanity top (from 1961), toilet partitions (we had replaced the originals at least 20 years ago), vanity wall, and electrical and lighting. However, as the demolition began, it became obvious that there were some serious issues with existing wall tile, drywall, radiator, and doors. If we simply focused on the vanity wall, the rest would look dated in comparison. We weighed the additional material and labor costs with the costs of simply repairing what was broken plus ongoing maintenance costs (wall repairs, painting, etc.). Rather than spending about \$16,000, we invested over \$23,000 but ended up with great looking, functional, nearly maintenance-free showcase. We now have a quartz vanity top with 3 integrated sinks, new faucets (one is hands-free) and related plumbing, new mirrors, battery-operated paper towel dispenser, stainless steel toilet paper holders, LED lights, 2 GFCI outlets, new wiring, new urinal, and 2 new solid oak doors. The project was performed by Flower Contracting (who did the majority of the 2017) Kitchen Renovation).

Apparently, some of the other bathrooms were jealous and decided to rebel. The Suite Bathroom toilet started leaking, one of the Center Room Bathroom shower water supplies leaked into the Commons ceiling, and the End Room Bathroom urinal flush valve was constantly letting water into the bowl. In addition, one of the Wing Bathroom toilet flappers failed, self-flushing regularly and wasting a lot of water. These plumbing issues were detected and resolved in the 1st week of March. The Commons ceiling was repaired a couple of weeks later after everything had dried out. On March 16, the Center Room Bathroom sink was clogged and resisted plunging, so Drain Brain was called in. It seems to never end...

Another project that had been on our maintenance schedule for a number of years was replacing all of the pushpin compact CFL light fixtures that had been installed back in the early 90's. Compact CFLs were touted as a revolution in lighting back then, but nobody realized that the ballasts would become noisy over time, the bulbs generated quite a bit of heat, which took its toll on the light sockets, and the bulbs needed replacement every 2-5 years. I personally replaced at least 1,000 bulbs (which cost about \$2.50/each), 50 sockets, and dozens of plastic diffuser globes. Today, LED is all the rage and I have just replaced all 50 CFL fixtures with fixtures utilizing an integrated LED (no bulbs to replace) which should last at least 25 years. They generate very little heat, are much brighter, are attractive, use very little electricity, and were relatively easy to install. They cost about \$35/each and, since I installed them, cost Acacia nothing for labor. At the request of an Active, I installed LED lights over the showers in the Suite and 2 nd Floor Landing bathrooms, but this required a contractor to provide a junction box with power over each shower.

The most recent planned maintenance was installing a doorbell for the main entrance as well as picture rails (as we did in the Wing Hallway a number of years ago) in the 3rd floor hallway and Mailbox Area. We simply ran out of wall space to hang composite photos. We are keeping our fingers crossed that we have no expensive, surprise maintenance issues in the next couple of years, as our maintenance funds have been greatly depleted.

The Active Chapter recently initiated seven new Brothers, which is a great accomplishment as participation in the Greek System continues to dwindle. The house is still not completely filled, nor will it be in the fall. The future of Cornell Acacia will hopefully be positive, but without Alumni financial support, it will not be. I remain perplexed by the fact that the majority of our 600+ alumni choose to NOT even pay their annual dues (which can be done via snail-mail or PayPal www.paypal.com to AcaciaCorpBoard@cornell.edu). Also, please check out the Cornell Acacia website (https://www.cornellacacia.org/) which is undergoing a major overhaul. We need your financial assistance, and we need it now. I realize some percentage of you might have financial, personal, or health issues, but not most of you! To those alumni who generously financially support Cornell Acacia, our thanks! To the rest of you, what's up?

Please email or call me if you have comments, concerns, suggestions, want to get involved, or simply want to say hello. It would be wonderful if I heard from some of you so I know you are as concerned, yet encouraged, as I am about the future of our beloved Acacia. The Mailbag column continues to be extremely short of news to share! Certainly there must be news (good and bad), so please share it.




Directing the Social Scene

Overall, living by our motto "Rush is not a season but a lifestyle," has definitely brought back outstanding results and I am pleased to have initiated the fine young men.






Lorenzo de Alba (1237) '22 Manhattan, NY




