

Message from Our Corporation Board President

Cornell Acacia is still going fairly strong in spite of the Covid Pandemic. This edition of The Traveler is the first printed copy since Spring 2020. With limited resources and time, we only sent Travelers out electronically in Spring 2021 and Winter 2021. Not every Alumnus has an email account, and we certainly don't have accurate email addresses for all that do have them.

At the beginning of the Pandemic, the Corp Board voted unanimously to keep Acacia open at the beginning of the pandemic since traveling home would have many more health risks than remaining open, especially to our international students. We offered to keep Acacia open as long as the residents formulated a plan and agreed to stick with it. Northcote averaged less than 10 residents for the 1 st couple of semesters, with most of the others attending classes from their homes. The Actives could not afford their share of the rent (which is charged to the Active Chapter and is not based on occupancy). So, they asked for a rent reduction (25%), to which the Corp Board unanimously agreed, and this was extended for the 2021-2022 academic year. With about 15 Actives now living in, along with a couple of boarders (each occupying one of the single rooms in the Wing), there are no empty bedrooms, and the Actives are paying full rent (\$40,000/semester).

Although COVID-19 has slowed down a lot of things in the world, the Corp Board still managed to replace the shingled roof (\$82,000), replace the Commons and Living Room carpeting with LVT (luxury vinyl tile, \$9,000), renovate the 2 nd Floor Landing Bathroom (\$2,700), the Laundry Room Bathroom (\$4,100), replaced 3 fire doors (\$8,000), and hired a landscaping company to improve the Service Entrance yard as well as the backyard (\$11,000). Brush, scrub trees and bushes were removed, the barbeque area was cleared, topsoil and mulch was put down, and grass was planted in the Service Entrance area where pine trees once stood until several years ago. We also had to address a leaking Wing roof (\$700) and just spent almost \$5,000 on preventative maintenance to extend its life for 5-10 more years. A carbon monoxide buildup in the Boiler Room resulted in hiring a chimney company to install a stainless-steel liner and cap in the hot water maker chimney flue and install dampers in both fireplace flues (Living Room and Chapter Room) at a total cost of \$10,500. The chimney guys required over ½ down payment, but then shut down their business before starting the project and we are still trying to get our money back. Finding a chimney repair company in Tompkins County has been quite challenging, but I just managed to get our project on the Ithaca Stovework's Fall/Winter schedule.

This past summer, four Alumni volunteers repaired walls and painted the 5 Wing double rooms (walls and ceilings). They did this in one weekend, and the results were absolutely amazing. The Corp Board provided the paint and supplies and the "fab four" (Roman Markh '06 (1072), Mark Hartman '07 (1086), Evan Helmsorig '07 (1079), Elie Track '06 (1077)) got it done, saving Acacia at least \$3,000. Thank you again!

But we're not done yet! We will hopefully replace our aging kitchen stove and ovens this semester, provided we have the funds (hint). The 9 fluorescent light fixtures in the Dining Room will be replaced with LED fixtures. And, of course, there are all the surprises that Northcote always seems to provide.

Beginning in August 2021, Cornell University mandated that every Greek living unit hire a Live-in Advisor. We recruited our first LIA (Romin), a grad student, who moved into the 2 nd Floor Suite (Rooms 36/37) and was a great asset to Cornell Acacia. He successfully defended his thesis and took a job in NYC. Romin recruited our current LIA, (Eraklis) who moved into Acacia in July. Eraklis picked up where Romin left off and is also doing a great job. The LIA is compensated with room and board along with a \$2,000/semester stipend. The job responsibilities are a work-in-progress, as Cornell provided virtually no guidance, training or support of Live-In Advisors.

This Academic Year continues to be a challenge, but I believe that we will survive and succeed if we continue to make intelligent choices and decisions. We are all in this together. At the beginning of this semester (September 2022), the Actives recruited and initiated 4 new members during Fall Rush. They are constantly in "Rush" mode, and already have prospects for Spring Rush which starts in January. If the Actives continue to improve their Rush performance, we could very well have a fully occupied house a year from now. I would be thrilled if the biggest challenge the Corp Board had to face is how to house everyone who wants to live in!

As already mentioned, Acacia is still not completely filled this academic year, and probably won't be next spring, either. Although there are no empty rooms, most of the double rooms are only occupied by one Brother. Acacia still relies on Alumni financial support which has not been very strong lately. I continue to be perplexed and bothered by the fact that the majority of our 600+ alumni choose to NOT even pay their annual dues (which can be done via snail-mail or PayPal www.paypal.com to AcaciaCorpBoard@cornell.edu). Also, please check out the Cornell Acacia website (https://www.cornellacacia.org/) which has undergone a major overhaul recently. We need your financial assistance, and we need it now. I realize some percentage of you might have financial, personal, or health issues, but not most of you! To those alumni who generously financially support Cornell Acacia, our thanks!


Derek Lao (1263) '25 Queens, New York

An International Northcote




