Message from Our Corporation Board President

Greetings! If you read the Spring 2023 Traveler, you know that Cornell Acacia was in survival mode, and our future was uncertain. I am thrilled to report that we are rebounding, and the future is looking bright! We were fortunate to recruit our 3rd Live-In Advisor, Zach Braswell, who arrived in late August and hit the ground running. Under his guidance, the handful of Acacia Actives successfully recruited 3 Fall Pledges who were initiated on 10/20/2023. Cornell Acacia maintains a list of more than 30 potential new members who will be Rushed during Formal Rush in January. Acacia National continues to provide assistance in the form of another visit in mid-October from Kelsey Gomez-Morrissey, Director of Chapter Development. At the same time, Sean Garity, Acacia Expansion Coordinator, will visit for a few days and will again be on-site for Formal Rush in January 2024.

Acacia only has three Actives living at Northcote in the Fall, and 2 of them are being graduated in December and most likely will not reside there in the Spring. So, we are currently renting out the rooms in the Wing to five Boarders, three of whom are actually participating in the Meal Plan. We hope to have all eight Wing rooms rented out for the Spring to fully cover the rent that the Actives typically would pay. The Corp Board has provided financial assistance (e.g., reduced rent and other subsidies, investing in projects to make Northcote more attractive to new members, etc.) to keep Northcote open.

Northcote, as always, still needs and receives much TLC. The heating system, now about 14 years old, has already required a new expansion tank, circulator pump, pressure relief valve, and zone valve this month in order to properly heat Northcote. I continue to replace a number of LED light fixtures that are no more than five years old because the ones we purchased from Home Depot are failing (over 50% failure rate). Otherwise, we have had no major maintenance issues and have temporarily delayed some planned maintenance (e.g., new range/oven units) until our cash flow improves.

Beginning in August 2021, Cornell University mandated that every Greek living unit hire a Live-In Advisor. The LIA is compensated with room and board along with a \$2,000/semester stipend. Our new LIA "Zach Braswell" has proved to be an asset to the house so far. Over halloween the actives were able to hold to parties without any risk management complications or visits from the police. I hear these events were a success and an enhancer to our reputation on campus!

This Academic Year continues to be a challenge, but I believe that we will survive and succeed if we continue to make intelligent choices and decisions. We are all in this together.

Acacia is still not completely filled this academic year, and probably won't be next fall, either. Although there are no empty rooms, most of the double rooms are only occupied by one Brother. Acacia still relies on Alumni financial support which has been quite strong lately. However, I continue to be perplexed and bothered by the fact that the majority of our 600+ alumni choose to NOT even pay their annual dues (which can be done via snail-mail, PayPal www.paypal.com to AcaciaCorpBoard@cornell.edu), or VENMO venmo.com (@Acacia-Fratnerity-13). Also, please check out the Cornell Acacia website (https://www.cornellacacia.org/) which has undergone a major overhaul.

We need your financial assistance, and we need it now. I realize some percentage of you might have financial, personal, or health issues, but not most of you! To those alumni who generously financially support Cornell Acacia, our thanks!







Brethren!

I hope this Traveler finds you well. As you no doubt gleaned from the previous issue, this summer Northcote was facing the very real possibility of not opening its doors after 116 years of continuous existence at Cornell.

As part of our effort to prevent that outcome, the Corporation Board (of which I am one of six members) elected to have boarders living in the house for the Fall 2023 semester. Specifically, the entire wing area of the house was dedicated to this purpose. The reasoning was twofold: the wing is behind a fire door, which mitigates noise in both directions; and the wing has its own bathroom, so that the boarders could collectively take ownership of its cleanliness. For those of you who have not visited the chapter house recently (and we always hope that you drop by!), the wing consists of eight rooms and a bathroom, as shown below circled in green. The original goal was to rent a maximum seven of the rooms, with the eighth to be used for Alumni visitors, for National Staff, and other ad hoc purposes.

I took on the responsibility of advertising the space, interviewing the boarders, fielding questions, and ultimately obtaining a signed lease agreement. At the start of the semester, we had five boarders signed up:

- · Bingjian, a post-doc originally from China and studying plant research
- · Loui, originally from Denmark and pursuing a CEMS Master's
- · Gabriel, a student in the Mechanical Engineering department
- · Danilo, originally from Ecuador
- · Jonathan, a student in the Economics department

As you might imagine, this decision involved some spirited debate, and not a small amount of trepidation. The nervousness was compounded because I did this all from Boston, and never got to meet anyone in person before or during move in!

I defer to the Actives for the specifics; in summary, the arrangement is working out better than ever the most optimistic of us could have imagined!
