### **Message from Our Corporation Board President**

What a year! We have a new Live-In Advisor, Justin Gage, who hit the ground running. Acacia looks fantastic, inside and out. Almost single-handedly, he transformed the grounds to their previous park-like appearance. Justin has been working feverishly to motivate the Actives so they will have a successful Spring Rush. Note that Fall Rush was a tune-up, and the Actives had several events, that generated the interest of potential new members (PNM), and should be well-prepared for the January festivities. The Corp Board purchased windbreakers and golf shirts for the Actives who proudly wear them on campus to help get Acacia's name out there.

Northcote has only four Actives living in this semester with a fifth coming for meals. And, although our goal was to rent all 8 Wing Rooms to non-members, only 3 rooms are currently rented to what we now refer to as Auxiliary Members. They are encouraged to help with Rush. The Village of Cayuga Heights objected to calling them "Boarders", as that is not permitted under Village ordinances. It's always something...

Quite recently, the Corp Board was informed by Acacia Fraternity Headquarters that, effective 10/1/2024, Acacia Fraternity Incorporated ("AFI" or "HQ") will no longer provide \$250,000/Occurrence and \$500,000/Aggregate of General Liability cover to Housing Corporations through AFI's National Policy. The bottom line is, Housing Corporations and Alumni Associations need to evaluate their individual insurance needs based on their individual situations and assets. Some Housing Corporations purchase their GL coverage from a third party while others have chosen to purchase their coverage through Omni Insurance. There are very few underwriters/carriers willing to insure a fraternity property for GL, especially when the advising and operating of the fraternity house are not separate and distinct. Active members in good standing, Chapter Advisors, and Financial Advisors are covered as they have always been from the per capita dues paid by the chapter. Alumni Associations in good standing will continue to be covered from both a GL & D&O perspective as always. Housing Corporations in good standing will continue to be covered for D&O purposes, but no longer are covered for GL purposes. We just paid \$14,780 for a year's coverage through Omni.

On a sad note, Brother James C. Showacre '50 (#447) passed way on 8/20/2024 at the age of 97. Jim was my mentor and role model and we worked together for many years when he was Corp Board Treasurer. At his memorial service, I caught up with Sam Morrie '77 (#833) and his wife, Sue.

I've been Acacia Corp Board President since 1982 and the past few years have been extremely stressful for Acacia and this year will be no different. Cornell Acacia is still in survival mode. The Corp Board has provided financial assistance (e.g., reduced rent and other subsidies, investing in projects to make Northcote more attractive to new members, etc.) to keep Northcote open. As I mentioned in the Spring 2024 Traveler, we will decide in March 2025 whether or not to continue operations or shut down Northcote. Should the Corp Board decide to shut it down, we need to decide whether or not a recolonization is a viable option. These decisions will be both financial (it will still cost at least \$60,000/year to own an empty house) and how many Actives are living in Northcote since numbers are vital to have a successful recruitment. Also, if we were to sell the Northcote, would a recolonization result in the loss of Alumni support? A different chapter house would not be part of the memories that almost all existing alumni have. These will be difficult decisions to make.

The Corp Board is cautiously optimistic that Cornell Acacia will rebound from continued setbacks. The small, yet enthusiastic Brotherhood is still in recruitment mode, and all seem intent on turning things around.

Acacia still relies on Alumni financial support which has been quite strong lately. However, I am always perplexed and bothered by the fact that the majority of our 600+ alumni choose to NOT even pay their annual dues (we are actively researching methods of payment which are not subject to fees (PayPal and Venmo do charge almost 3%). Also, please check out the Cornell Acacia website (<a href="https://www.cornellacacia.org/">https://www.cornellacacia.org/</a>) for the most current information. We need your financial assistance, and we need it now. I realize some percentage of you might have financial, personal, or health issues, but not most of you! To those alumni who generously financially support Cornell Acacia, our thanks!


