

A Message from Our Corporation Board President

The 2024-2025 Academic Year was interesting, to say the least. Our new Live-In-Advisor, Justin Gage, has been a tremendous asset. The Corp Board has had many meetings to discuss the future of Cornell Acacia. Formal Rush did not meet expectations. We unanimously voted to remain in operation for 2025-2026. As of 3/23/2025, the Continuous Open Bidding (COB) Rush "season" has resulted in three (3) Potential New Members (PNMs) signing bids, and currently three (3) PNMs who are still deciding on their bids. This was partly due to an almost unbelievable membership incentive of \$600/month for room & board for members! This has certainly generated interest in Acacia. The Actives continue to hold events and dinners to encourage additional members, with an outdoor event with a local Reggae band in April.

Acacia has only three Actives living at Northcote now (2 of whom are graduating in May), along with 2 Auxiliary Members who pay room and board. One of the Auxiliary Members signed a bid and will become a full-fledged member. We continue to face unexpected maintenance expenses, with the most recent being a \$1,000 repair (fan and swirl plate) on one of our two boilers and a \$7,400 replacement of our hot water storage tank (which has started to leak). These repairs will have been completed by the time you read this. Also, the 10-year-old kitchen refrigerator/freezer compartment does not maintain the proper temperature and may need to be replaced.

Insurance costs continue to rise, and it is costing us a fortune to carry the mandatory insurance. We have a \$10,881 Commercial Property Insurance premium due at the end of March.

Acacia still relies on Alumni financial support, which has been inconsistent lately. We are seeing fewer donors, but their donations are higher than normal. We need the continued financial support of ALL Cornell Acacia Alumni. However, I am always perplexed and bothered by the fact that the majority of our 600+ alumni choose to NOT even pay their annual dues (which can be done via snail-mail, PayPal www.paypal.com to AcaciaCorpBoard@cornell.edu), or VENMO venmo.com (@Acacia-Fraternity-13). We can now also accept payments via CashApp with a fixed \$3.50 transaction fee. Please check out the Cornell Acacia website (https://www.cornellacacia.org/) for details on payment options. *We need your financial assistance, and we need it now.* I realize some percentage of you might have financial, personal, or health issues, but not most of you! To those alumni who generously financially support Cornell Acacia, our thanks!


