Message From Our Corporation Board President

At long last, I have mostly good news to share! In March 2025, the Corp Board unanimously voted to keep Cornell Acacia open this year. Our Live-In Advisor, Justin Gage, is in his second year and continues to be a great caretaker of Northcote, an inspirational leader, and an advisor to all the residents. In an emergency cost-cutting move, the Corp Board made the difficult decision not to continue using our former chef, David D'Aprix, and Justin now also assumes the Chef duties at significantly reduced compensation. Additionally, Cornell Acacia managed to get Justin McGrath, Chapter Growth and Development Consultant, to live at Northcote for the 2025- 2026 Academic Year. Having two Justins can be confusing, but we're up to the challenge! We also have an excellent Venerable Dean, Kevin Rivera, in his Senior Year, who is dedicated to seeing the complete resurgence of Cornell Acacia this year. Our other three Actives, two of whom are Cornell Grad Students, are also super enthused, and there is a feeling of safety and positivity within the confines of Northcote. Our shared vision for the future of Acacia is paying dividends. At Homecoming Weekend, two Fall Pledges were inducted, one of whom will be moving in over Winter Break, and the other is a grad student and Auxiliary Member (formerly known as "boarder"). The mindset of all residents, both Actives and Auxiliary Members, is that Rush is constant, not a seasonal event. Acacia has a great pool of Potential New Members (PNMs), both freshmen and upperclassmen.

The Dining Experience has attracted additional income, as almost all the Auxiliary Members are participating, and we even have some female students who live across the street, occasionally dining with us. Although our goal was to rent all 8 Wing Rooms to non-members, six rooms are currently rented to Auxiliary Members. They are encouraged to, and do, help with Rush.

Speaking of Dining, in another cost-saving decision, Cornell Acacia is no longer using Student Management Corporation (SMC) to purchase food and supplies. Justin Gage has negotiated the same discounts we were getting from two vendors, but we don't have to pay the 10% Administrative Fee assessed by SMC. It had been 5% since SMC's inception (back when I was Kitchen Steward, I believe), but doubled at the beginning of 2025. Justin G. also shops at Tops, Wegmans, and other local stores to take advantage of many great sales, saving even more money. We have also suspended the linen service (which basically provided us with a bag of clean towels each week) and bottled water delivery, saving over \$100/week.

The bad news is that costs continue to rise. Last October, we had to find General Liability coverage on our own after Acacia Headquarters removed it from their offerings. The cost of that insurance (from Omni Insurance) is over \$14,000/year. There are very few underwriters/carriers willing to insure a fraternity's property for GL. However, one of our Directors, Bruce Schneider '78 (842), is working with another insurer, and we hope to achieve a significant cost reduction.

Part of Justin Gage's vision is that Homecoming is essential to a successful fraternity. He planned what we believe was the first such event at Northcote in more than a dozen years. He prepared a delicious meal on 10/4/2025, booked the Murali Coryell Trio, who played in the Living Room for several hours after, and cooked brunch on Sunday morning. We had a relatively small group of Alumni, but Northcote was rocking the entire weekend. Our goal is for 30 guests in 2026. Please plan on joining us then!

I've been Acacia Corp Board President since 1982. The past few years have been highly stressful for Acacia, and last year was the most so. However, all of the pieces are falling into place (probably due to divine intervention), and I am convinced that Cornell Acacia will be around for another 120 years.

Acacia still relies on Alumni financial support, which has been quite strong lately. However, I am constantly perplexed and bothered by the fact that the majority of our 600+ alumni choose NOT even to pay their annual dues (we are actively researching methods of payment which are not subject to fees (PayPal and Venmo do charge almost 3%). Also, please check out the Cornell Acacia website (https://www.cornellacacia.org/) for the most current information. *We need your financial assistance, and we need it now.* Some percentage of you might have economic, personal, or health issues, but not most of you! To the alumni who generously support Cornell Acacia financially, our thanks!

Please check your email to learn about the Acacia 120 Capital Campaign, launched in October.



Our Sweethearts



Trustee'd Alumnus Hard at Work

Brother Paul Hayre '91 — From the Hill to Harvard and Back Again



Recently, our dear Brother Paul Hayre '91, was elected to the Cornell Board of Trustees! During a brief phone call in between meetings, I had the pleasure of speaking with Paul. Despite being worked harder than an Acusmatici in the Pythagorean Institute, he was full of energy, eager, and honored to take on the responsibilities of a Trustee. Below is a recollection of our conversation, supplemented with an article from Cornell University News regarding his election. Cheers to you, Brother Hayre! Thank you for your continued dedicated service to Cornell, and to Acacia.

When Brother Paul Hayre '91 talks about Cornell, he doesn't just recall memories—he recalls missions. "Cornell was a defining experience," he says. "It's where I learned to build, to listen, and to serve."

On Leadership and Gratitude

"I've been driven by gratitude since the day I left Ithaca," Paul reflects. "Every opportunity I've had traces back to something I learned on the Hill."

As an undergrad, he helped restructure student government and bring transparency to student activity fees—early examples of the practical leadership that would mark his career. In the decades since, he's built teams and institutions with that same sense of balance between purpose and accountability.

Today, Brother Hayre leads **Harvard Grid**, an entrepreneurship center connecting scientists, engineers, and investors to turn research into real-world impact. "My job is to marshal brilliant minds toward shared outcomes," he explains. "That's something Cornell taught me early on—how to rally people from all walks toward a common goal."

He's also co-founded and guided several health-tech companies, including **Sano Diagnostics** and **Monarch Health**, and sits on multiple boards in healthcare and innovation. His ability to bridge academia, business, and public service has made him one of Cornell Engineering's most active alumni leaders.

On Cornell Today

In an era of changing policies and shifting campus climates, Brother Hayre believes Cornell must continue to stand for openness and equality. "It's hard to value truth when you can't recognize it," he says. "We have to teach students to navigate a world of competing 'truths'—to listen, challenge, and still find common ground."

He points to admissions diversity, campus safety, and financial aid as critical priorities. "We can't let access slip backward," he warns. "Cornell should always be a place where excellence meets empathy."

On Service Beyond the Hill

For more than three decades, Brother Hayre has woven service into every chapter of his life. He's led the **Cornell Club of Boston**, chaired **Engineering alumni councils**, served on the **Cornell University Council**, and mentored countless students through programs like *Coaching and Mentoring for Professional and Student Success* (ENGRG 1052).

"I've been fortunate to stay close to the university through so many avenues," he says. "Acacia taught me that leadership doesn't end when you graduate—it just changes form."

Beyond Cornell, he's been equally active in Harvard's innovation ecosystem, mentoring student founders and judging competitions at the **Rock Center for Entrepreneurship and Harvard LifeLabs**.

On Family and Full Circles

Over lunch at Trillium decades ago, Paul met fellow Cornellian **Jeannette Perez-Rossello '91**—now his wife of more than 30 years. Their three children grew up hearing stories of life on the Hill; one, **Alex '24, MHA '26,** continues that legacy today.

"Cornell is where my life truly began," Paul says. "It's where I learned that ideas alone don't change the world—people working together do."

And that, he adds, is the Cornell way—and the Acacia way.

An Inter-National Perspective

If you caught my digital *Traveler* article recapping our wonderful Homecoming Weekend, or have seen my name referenced in other articles in this edition of the *Traveler*, you may know me as the Acacia IHQ Chapter Growth and Development Consultant stationed at Northcote for the 2025-2026 academic year. While my role is to support the Chapter to the best of my ability, my commitment to Acacia—and to the success of your Chapter specifically—runs much deeper than that. It is because of the experience afforded to me in my undergraduate years, by and through Acacia, in a tumultuous time for the whole world, that I stand here today in your beautiful home of Northcote—ready and willing to do all that I can to see Cornell Acacia thrive for another 120 years.

My story with Acacia began during my freshman year, in the fall of 2019. Having grown up in the fairly insular Adventist community of Loma Linda, California, joining a fraternity in college was the last thing I ever expected to do. My perception of Greek life came from TV shows, films, and the horror stories circulating in the news. And while UC Berkeley isn't exactly Faber College, some of the things I heard my friends endure in other fraternities didn't exactly scream "brotherhood" to me. By mid-October, though, I found myself feeling alienated, overwhelmed, and at times terrified of this brave new world I had entered. I lacked true community—and I craved it deeply. It was in that state that I found Acacia—or, more truthfully, that Acacia found me.

I was introduced to Acacia by a friend of mine in the dorms—my next-door neighbor, in fact. Here was someone I never would have imagined joining a fraternity, and yet here he was, loving every minute of it. He introduced me to the expansion coordinator, Brother Marshall Farren from the Indiana Chapter, whom Headquarters had sent out to restart the Cal Chapter. He told me of a fraternity that sought balance and excellence among its members, both academically and socially —one whose motto is human service. A fraternity with a beautiful chapter house just waiting for enough members to fill its halls once again. A fraternity beginning anew—one I would have a real opportunity to shape and grow from the very start, helping to turn that vision into reality. From that moment, I was hooked. I already had aspirations of becoming president one day. But before that could happen, real work needed to be done—and my skills needed to be tested.

After being elected recruitment chair following a pledging period of barely a week, I felt ill-prepared but hungry to learn what it would take to bring in more members. Our Corp Board set an ambitious goal: to double the chapter from 15 to 30 brothers in order to secure the chapter house for the next year. Equipped with a crash course in recruitment best practices from the Officer

Summit and a winning mindset, we not only hit that goal—we surpassed it. Riding high into Spring Break with recruitment on my mind, I thought nothing could stop us. But then came the Spring Break that never ended. Despite the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, we managed to retain just over 20 members. With few options available, the Corp Board allowed the 10 of us willing to move into the chapter house in the fall of 2020 to do so at a reduced rate. Though we had no idea what each day would bring, we kept the dream alive, relying on one another to make it through.

I'd like to say that belief in the dream kept things running smoothly, but those were incredibly trying times. Trust faltered, faith wavered, and we faced constant challenges—especially as many of us were still getting to know each other. I stepped into the role of Venerable Dean the following year, uncertain of our survival, but as stubborn as ever to succeed. During that time, I learned invaluable lessons about keeping a team united and moving toward a common goal. I faltered, yes—but it was ultimately faith and trust in my brothers, and their faith and trust in me, that kept us alive through to the fall. Despite our nonexistent reputation on campus and our limited experience, we once again managed to double our membership by the end of the school year. I was also elected as an Undergraduate Counselor, a role that ultimately brought me here today. It was through that experience that I truly learned how Acacia is bigger than any one chapter—and that when we support one another, we all rise together.

Wanting to serve in a position where I could more directly support our chapters, I stepped down from the Council and joined the staff. It's a decision I'm profoundly grateful for, as it has led me here—to Cornell, to Northcote, in this moment in time. What I saw on my initial visits last year—while difficult—lit a fire in me to return in earnest and give everything I can to your Chapter. Now, the Brotherhood stands on the brink of renewal, ready to succeed and rise again. I know this because I've seen it. I've lived it.

That's not to say there aren't challenges—nor that more won't come. Cornell is a campus unlike any other, as I've already learned this fall. But with my experience, the dedication of our active members, and your support, we *can* and *will* succeed. Please feel free to contact me anytime with suggestions, questions, or even just to chat. Lastly, I want to extend my deepest gratitude to the great Bill Utic '77—a man for whom we could fill multiple Traveler volumes and still barely scratch the surface of his contributions to Acacia. A man without whom we may never have regained ownership of our historic chapter house at Cal. And a man without whom I may never have had this fine fraternal opportunity.
